ST FRANCIS: PATCHED AT THIRD ORDER CONFERENCE

"Saint Francis – a Patch on a Hurting World" was the theme for the Third Order Franciscan's Australian Provincial gathering in Perth at the end of September. About 60 of the Province's 350 members gathered in Belmont's Bel Eyre motel to worship, enjoy each other's company and listen to two excellent guest speakers.

The Rev'd Canon Dr John Dunnill of Murdoch University unfolded the idea of sacrificial love, showing that Christ-like selflessness was far closer to the Bible than the 'myth of redemptive violence' which underlies much of the world's pain today. In his three talks, John displayed his usual humour, humanity and ability to clearly explain theological ideas.

Our second speaker was Dr Robert Wilhelm from Washington DC. Bob had us spellbound with stories from the Franciscan tradition, particularly those that showed the ways Francis is a patch on the world. The tale of Francis' childhood friends, the knights, bringing the dying Francis back to Assisi, illustrated that humility, not money or force, evoke a loving response.

We may never fully understand what it means to "feed our wolf", but we will continue to have a vivid memory of Bob's telling of the story of the Gubbio wolf and the conversion of the Gubbio people from pride to a fuller understanding of themselves.

Our Bishop Protector, Archbishop Roger Herft, led our opening Eucharist, and commissioned Ted Witham as Provincial Minister. Archbishop Roger preached on 'leaving doors open'. We took his advice literally and left the doors of the conference centre open. Fr George Harvey from Bunbury had created a stunning worship space in the bland conference room, and the open doors invited several hotel guests to wander in and see what these Franciscans were up to.

On the altar was a cloth pinned together from imaginative patches that members had decorated to offer as part of the Conference.

It was also good to have representatives of the friars (First Order Franciscans) Brother Alfred BoonKong and Brother Nathan-James present for all of the Conference. Brothers Alfred and Nathan had been in WA for the two previous weeks visiting schools and parishes. Michael Maguire, the Regional Minister of the Roman Catholic Secular Franciscan Order, with his wife Angela joined us for our Final celebration Eucharist.

The Third Order met in Chapter to rejoice at its growth in Papua New Guinea, to support a new office of Franciscans International for the East Asian region in Bangkok, and to explore ways in which Third Order members can engage more dynamically in ministry with the whole Church.

Your Regional Minister has a CD of Bob's stories and talks, and the printed version of John's Bible studies will soon be available.

New Appointments


At Provincial Chapter, my appointments to Chapter were ratified: Sally Buckley becomes the Assistant Provincial Minister, David White is the new Provincial Secretary and Geoff Jordan remains our Treasurer. Once again, we thank Wendy Brack for her enthusiasm and hard work as Secretary.

Standing Committee will consist of the Provincial Minister, the Provincial Chaplain, the Treasurer and Helen Granowski. This group will meet to approve emergency finance and policy decisions, and will report to Provincial Chaplain any actions it takes.

Third Order Subscriptions

Chapter also voted to raise the subscriptions to \$80 (and to \$115 for couples who are both tertiaries). This is the first raise for quite a few years, and is necessary to meet our budget.

Costs generally have increased over the past few years. For example, 37% of the budget is required to gather Provincial chapter together every year, and air-fares and retreat house costs have both increased.



General Chapter voted to support the new office of Franciscans International in Bangkok. Our support will be \$1,000 per annum over the next few years, and this will help pay the rent and two full-time staff. I strongly support this initiative. It is one of the few direct contacts we in wealthy nations can have with the very poor – and this contact is central to our Franciscan calling. It is also great to work with the wider Franciscan family.

Our Treasurer also brought to our attention that last year we received only 75% of our budget for subscriptions. Chapter thought that there might be a number of reasons for this low return of subscriptions, but we had to confront the possibility that some members may simply be not paying. Your subscription, like the Community Obedience and the personal rule of life, are basic to your commitment to the Third Order. Paying our subs enables the Order to exist, and it also goes some way to satisfying our need to give and belong.

Chapter also emphasized again that you should talk to your Regional Minister if you are financially unable to pay your subscription and to work out a reasonable contribution for your situation. In addition, Chapter also authorised Regional Ministers to collect subs in instalments if that helps you.

When you receive your subscription form early next year, please do act on it straight away.

Study and Youth Initiatives

Sydney Tertiary Michael Giffin has developed a unit of study at Broken Bay Institute on Franciscan Leadership, which Novice Counsellors, Area Convenors and others may find useful. (Details at www.bbi.catholic.edu.au). I am also working with Brother Donald Campbell and others on a more basic unit on Franciscan spirituality suitable for novices and all interested in our spirituality. Details will be available soon.

Chapter also appointed a small committee to work with Brother Nathan-James on establishing a 'Franciscan Gap Year' where young people could experience Franciscan community and worship, take part in service to the very poor, experience another culture as a Christian and gain a Certificate. I'll keep your informed.

Archbishop elect Philip Freier TOSSF has been elected by an overwhelming majority as the next Archbishop of Melbourne at a meeting of Synod members in August .

I was invited by Archbishop Penman as one of four to review the electoral process of an archbishop and it was clear that the said Archbishop wanted an electoral Synod and the first such Synod met following his death. I have found each such subsequent synod a difficult experience but welcome our recent prayer and discernment. I enjoyed meeting and conversation with both Philip and Joy on a visit to Darwin several years ago and I remember that Joy most kindly drove me to the airport on my reluctant return to wintry Melbourne! Our Archbishop elect is 51 and has been the Bishop of the Northern Territory since 1999 having been ordained a priest in 1984. He has been Examining Chaplain to the Archbishop of Brisbane (1993-1999,) Area Dean of Burnett , Rector of Christ Church, Bundaberg and St Oswalds, Banyo in the Diocese of Brisbane.

He trained as a teacher and taught at Thursday Is, Kowanyama and Yarrabah . His qualifications include Ph.D from James Cook University, M. Ed. University of Newcastle ,B.D. Melbourne College of Divinity and Dip. Ed. University of Queensland, B Applied Science Q.I.T.

In the report presented to us as electors it was stated that he has provided strong Episcopal leadership and strategic thinking to a diocese with scarce resources and has encouraged aboriginal leadership and created conditions for both clergy and lay to be effective in ministry. His interest in theological education is evidenced by his role as Chair of the Board of Delegates of the Australian College of Theology since 2002. Not an easy task I am advised!.

We welcome him and his wife Joy to Melbourne, a diocese also financially challenged and appreciate that he states that "it is an absolute honour and privilege to be the elected Archbishop of Melbourne." Sue Chapman TOSSF

Prayer in the silence of our mind seems to be one of the thing that we all share. We all yearn for this quiet space, this timelessness. I have often found this upon a pew in a quiet church. For a time in a place you are still while the world goes rushing on by

Rows upon rows that stretch out in that silent space. Lines of perspective going off into the distance, as each pew gets smaller gets smaller & smaller. The aged wood reflects beautifully the coloured light coming in through the stained glass windows.

Mediations on a Pew

Presented by Mr. Ian Randall St.Paul's Chapel Thursday 2nd March 2006

Introduction,

I wonder if you have hear it said "be in the moment." We Westerners are commonly criticised as never being aware of the present. We are either thinking about where we have just been or working through where we are meant to be next. We seem not to be able to focus on what is happening around us. At school the moment a bell rings you are no longer meant to be where you are so we are forever rushing on to catch up with ourselves. Today I want you to be, in this moment, to be still within yourselves, to think and to ponder with me.

We are all people of body, flesh & matter but we are also of spirit. If you consider yourself a Christian or perhaps even 'spiritual' I trust that this mediation or reflection will also have meaning for you.

Why a pew?

You sit in a pew each week and I bet you never give them a moments thought.

Pews have been on my mind recently. Several weeks ago I received a phone call from my Brother, who attends a particular Anglican church on Broadway asking if I wanted to buy a pew as his church was getting rid of them all and replacing them with individual plastic chairs.

They are made simply from expansive lengths of timber from the tallest of trees. The ageless trees, who's roots dug deep and drew cool waters from the earth. Birds sheltered in their branches, from nest to egg to feather to flight. Part of earths great cycle of life. The spring, the winter. Life & Death & Life.

Cut down by muscle & axe, milled with sweat, toil and labour, crafted and carved by the carpenter. Christ was a Carpenter, like his father Joseph. His hands were calloused by years of work, with the saw and hammer. Jesus felt the pain of the splinter, the strike of the hammer upon the thumb, became tired and thirsty. He would have crafted with care and built with love. I wonder if Jesus ever made a pew?

I have seen my own children playing games of chasing after church running in and out of the rows, weaving over and under, Like a labyrinth or a maze, but never getting lost.

They are is designed to fit as many people in the smallest amount of space. I have mainly seen pews where followers of Christ have gathered. From small stone country churches to large city Cathedrals. In some places in the world pews are hundreds of years old. In many places they have remained unmoved for year upon year. As the lives of people come and go like the grass of the fields. They are never alone. Always together. And like God's people they are never quite lined up straight. They are present with their prayers, their songs and their lives.

In a pew, your presence is always welcome. Although the feel is cold to the touch it always warm up. You belong where ever you sit. An object in time that many others have occupied before you. What of the people who sat here? Consider them, you, me, a street person, the accountant, tradesman, widow, child, the happy, the sad, the lonely & the lost. The tears that were shed, the prayers that were offered. Or the school boy who etched his name in that timeless place.

Many who lived their lives are no longer here. Their days are spent. They too have shared your troubles and have also called out to the lord for comfort and strength. The countless numbers of people have sat where you are and the many more will follow you. The pew has become a seat among the saints.

I have seen Old Church pews in many other places too. In café's, antique shops, kitchens, on verandahs, in hall ways. Their new owners lovingly restore them. A pew always adds a certain touch class, an historical aesthetic to a room. I recommend you find one for your home. See if you can find a church throwing them away, they don't want them or need them anymore. A pew away from it's purpose, its people, its prayer, its place, seems sad to me. It tells me of an age that is no longer here.

We don't seen to be like Tokin's Elves . . . where their history seemed to stretch back before memory. Where everything that was made to last for centuries, where everything was beautiful and was always loved. Not our age. We see the world to be consumed. Did you know that PC stands for Plastic computer? We take, we use and we throw away. The world is groaning with the weight of our waste and the scares from all that we take. A mobile phone is old in two years. Mine doesn't even have a camera and the company that sold me it has changed its name to a number. No wonder we of our generation are so confused?

We like things new & modern and especially plastic. Is your Church going for that special plastic look? A plastic Jesus with a nice cheesy grin. I wonder will happen to the plastic chair? Will it be lovingly repaired and its scratches removed and placed in the hall ways of the future. I doubt it. No the plastic chair will also be thrown away, along with everything else we make in our generation. But we are not satisfied. Our generation is madly searching for God, for a real life, a real existence, for the real Jesus, for real peace, & for real love.

My Jesus seems a little more real a little more earthy, a little more human. When he washed the disciples feet I see him washing off real dirt, not stinking executive sweat. He spent his days with common people, and did not seek the acclaim of the rich and important. He loved the poor, the widow, the nobody of any importance. He loved the person that the world walked on by. He understood their lives, our lives, he was living a life himself. So not worry about your troubles, look at the birds and how I care for them. You are far more valuable then they.

When you sit in a pew perhaps feeling like you are nobody special, not up the front in a place where everybody can see your importance, know you are loved by God, most valuable, most important. Just as you are – Just like you are. Mediate on the world, see the marvels of creation, find a quiet place in your own lives and let your soul sing the praises of the Lord.

I hope you can consider some of these things the next time you sit down on a pew.

Report on PNG:

a) Tony moved that Papua New Guinea be split into Regions in Formation around the areas of Popondetta and Dogura. Seconded John. Carried

b) Chapter was asked to endorse Eli Kombega as Regional Minister for the Popondetta Region in Formation. Moved Rosemary. Seconded by Vic. Carried.

c) Tony has sent a simplified version of our manual to the Tertiaries in PNG.

It consists of Community Obedience, the Rule, Principles, some Franciscan Holy Days, Day of Penitence, Order for Profession, Novicing and Renewals and other Prayers. This was first printed in 1999.

d) Tony moved that we encourage an experimental Third Order Community in PNG using Jean Isemba's convent with the Third Order Rule as a component of an annual celibacy vow. Seconded Helen. Carried

PROVINCIAL CHAPLAINS REPORT 2006

The Society of St Francis, in the spirit and teaching of our founder, makes it clear that any position of leadership is expressed by the word "minister" from the Minister General to Provincial Ministers to Regional Ministers. One could understand that all members of the Society "minister" to one another. Of course the Latin origin of "minister" means "a servant". We often feel in the Church that pastoral care and administration are very different, and yet the root word for administration is also "minister". So it means that whether we are involved in pastoral care or in administration we are all servants to one another! That certainly makes our Society different from the way the Church works with a dichotomy between pastoral care and administration. Take a bishop's pastoral staff or crozier; some say it is a symbol of jurisdiction which is about power and administration, while others say it is obviously a symbol of pastoral care. It is so important for us to be servants to one another.

During this past year I have been more involved with regions in formation than in Australian matters. I was able to attend a retreat in Townsville, but I have not been anywhere else in Australia.

Korea

I heard from Christopher John SSF at Canterbury last year that the Tertiaries that are listed in our prayer cycle have dropped out. One of my daughters is fluent in Korean and I had hoped to have gone up there with her and find out what is happening in the Tertiary world there, but that was not possible this year. Graeme Webb was in Korea, and I understand he has left. He is a New Zealander.

Singapore

I visited Singapore on my way to IPTOC last August. Our three Tertiaries are very mature. I was with them when they renewed their vows. I spoke at the Cathedral at a weekday service and two enquirers came forward, however I haven't heard what has happened since then. It appears difficult for the Singaporeans to feel part of the Singapore/Malaysia Region.

Hong Kong

On the way back from England I preached at St John's Cathedral in Hong Kong on the ministry of the Third Order. I am waiting advice from Novice Counsellors about the election to Profession of our four Novices, Simon Fong, Stephen Farmer, Burm Hur and Sun Ling White.

Papua New Guinea

I have visited PNG twice since the last Provincial Chapter. In 2005 I was there for two weeks from 13 - 27 July. I was at Popondetta for five days during which time a meeting of fifteen Tertiaries was held over the weekend at Haruro Friary, where we also visited the Community of the Resurrection Convent where I preached.

During our meeting it was deemed that the Popondetta Diocese and the Dogura Diocese should be two Regions because of there is very little contact between the two Dioceses because of distance, terrain and no road access. The meeting elected Eli Kombega to be the Regional Minister of Popondetta as a Region in Formation until Chapter forms a new Region. Discussions were held between Tertiaries and First Order Brothers about PNG becoming a new Tertiary Province. It was too early for any conclusions to be reached.

Unfortunately my visit to the Dogura Diocese in 2005 did not enable me to go beyond Alotau. I stayed at the Friary at Ukaka, not far from the town. However five Tertiaries were able to be with me, two from parishes nearby and three who had come from Cape Vogel about 150 kilometres away via a lot of walking and on a dinghy. It was then that I discovered that the Tertiaries in that Diocese had not seen any Novice Formation Notes, nor did they have copies of Statutes or the Community Obedience. Most of them had the Prayer Cycle, sent to them by Wendy, the Provincial Secretary. We planned for a Convocation to be held at Uga near Cape Vogel during Francistide. This was initiated by the Tertiaries and ultimately twenty-five Tertiaries attended, but unfortunately they were all Novices and could not elect a person to be Regional Minister in Formation for Dogura.

When I returned home I prepared a shorter form of a Manual, the Principles and Novice Formation Notes. All these were sent by mail for distribution at meetings prepared at Uga and Popondetta at Francistide.

After further correspondence early this year, I planned to spend a fortnight in each of these regions, including a lot of teaching sessions with reference to the information that they would have received. I was in PNG for 28 days in July 2006. I spent two days in Port Moresby where I had further talks with Bro Clifton Henry with reference to the First Order assisting with the pastoral care and novice counselling for Tertiaries. He informed me that the Province of the Pacific was being divided into the Province of PNG and the Province of the Solomon Islands. He agreed that the formation of a Tertiary Province of PNG would seem to be a possibility with the First Order Brothers assisting and working more together. It was also opportune that he was going to be in Popondetta for most of the time that I was there.

The meeting at Popondetta was held at Eli Kombega's home near the village of Urio south east of Popondetta. I was welcomed by Eli's parents and other dancers in a traditional Oro welcome. Twenty six Tertiaries had gathered for the meeting where we spent a whole week together. We had two very solid teaching days sorting out the meaning of the Principles. Every day Morning and Evening Prayer were said (with some of the canticles sung). We worked out a way of putting the Community Obedience into the Daily Office and decided that we would include the Offices in the shared Community Obedience in that Region. Exemptions would be available. There are people who may not be very literate but know the canticles etc of the Offices!

We went in to Popondetta a few times which gave me a chance to see other Tertiaries who could not come to the Convocation, and also to meet the new Bishop, Joseph Kopapa. Our Tertiary Jason Evari is now in charge of the HIV/AIDS promotion and care in Popondetta as well as working at the Cathedral. Six Novices had walked for two days from Ambasi further up the coast. They asked if their Professions could take place a Ambasi so that the people up there could witness it and find out what the Tertiary ministry is.

On Saturday 15 July I left from Oro Bay on a coastal boat for Cape Vogel. We arrived at Tufi after dark and it was decided to stay the night tied to the wharf as the wind was up and a lot of reefs had to be negotiated, so we all slept on the seats. We set out at daybreak and called in at a number of villages including Wanigela and arrived at Trakwaruru on Cape Vogel in the evening. Here I was met by a large party of traditional warriors with bows and arrows and long black palm spears. In this re-enactment I was defended by the Tertiaries. I was challenged about what I was doing landing at their village. I responded by calling out the prayer, "Lord make me an instrument of your peace..." Immediately all the aggressive noise quietened down, and by the time I finished the prayer, many of the people were joining in, including some of the warriors!

All of us who were visiting Tertiaries stayed in an old Mothers Union House where we slept on the floor. I stayed on Cape Vogel for ten days during which we had two full teaching days and visited a number of villages, and with St James Day coming up we walked to Mukawa, where a mission was founded by Samuel Tomlinson in 1898. Eight hundred people turned up for the celebration. There I stayed with one of our Tertiaries Morrison Kadada. I preached at the Eucharist on St James Day.

There were twenty Tertiaries at this meeting, with a number of people asking to become Enquirers including quite a lot of Companions of the First Order. During one workshop we had Companions in a "role play" asking all sorts of questions about what is so special about being a Tertiary and what do they do. This opened up a lot about the importance of taking vows and committing oneself to Franciscan ministry. Again this meeting felt that Community Obedience should include Daily Offices. Throughout all the village churches the Offices are said even if there is no priest.

After three days at Mukawa, we organised a dinghy to take us to Dogura, further down the coast. The Area Convenor, Lawrence Yakawa was appointed to go with me from here on. After an early start it took us all morning to get to Dogura powered by a 40 hp outboard calling in on a few villages. We stayed with our Tertiary Bishop, Telita Talanoa, and planned for the Professions of the Novices at Makuwa on Sunday 10 December, to fit in with the Professions in Popondetta on Sunday 17 December.

We had to leave at four in the morning by dinghy so we could catch a PMV at a village adjacent to Alotau to save us going around into Milne Bay where the weather at that time of the year is very rough from the winds of the South East Monsoon. It was a clear night with starlight from the sky and "starlight" from the sea with plankton being disturbed by the wake of the dinghy! I stayed at the Ukaka Friary and celebrated St James Day with them on Sunday before leaving to go home.

Third Order Regular

An interesting situation exists with one of our PNG Tertiaries, Jean Isemba. She was Professed in 1999 and soon afterwards felt she was called to a life of celibacy as Franciscan. With her family she has a house which is called "Little Portion Convent" near Agenahambo in the Popondetta Diocese. She was referred to the CSF and Sr Ruth from San Francisco came out to visit her a couple of times. She went to San Francisco for about six months early this decade and she suffered severe culture shock and did not want to go outside.

At IPTOC in 2005 I spoke to both Sr Ruth and Sr Joyce, who is the Minister General. The prospects for Jean did not look good as CSF could not release sisters to go to PNG. Sr Joyce did not think it was practical for Jean to come to San Francisco again and test her vocation. Jean was offered three options from Sr Joyce.

• Continue as a member of the Third Order of the Society of St Francis and try to interest other women of the Third Order in PNG who might be attracted to the idea of sharing Franciscan community life with you permanently or for shorter times.

• Join the Melanesian Sisterhood or the Sisters of the Churh in the Solomon Islands to test a vocation with them.

• Learn about living the religious life by spending at least a year with either the Melanesain Sisterhood opr the Sisters of the Church in the Solomon Islands and then try to set up a new form of Franciscan life in PNG. Both of these communities have close contact with the SSF brothers in the Solomon Islands. By staying in the Pacifric, culture and language would be closer to your own. You would be able to learn from the experience of women who are already living the religious life in the Islands.

I spoke to a Roman Catholic man who is a member of the Third Order Regular at IPTOC and I received a copy of their revised rule. I gave a copy to Jean but it was a bit complicated. As a matter of interest all the RC Franciscan Orders who are not Clares actually are Third Order Regulars. So I got in touch with the Franciscan Sisters of Mary, and they don't have a convent on PNG. There is another one but that is in New Britain.

This matter was discussed at the Convocation at Popondetta and at Cape Vogel. It appeared that we could set up a Third Order Regular using the vows of the Third Order with an addition to enable people to take a vow of celibacy once a year. One thing Jean is wanting is an established a Franciscan "Sisterhood, taking the veil". I would be happy to move a resolution that we establish an experimental Third Order Regular in Papua New Guinea using Jean's Convent with the Third Order Rule with a component of an annual celibacy vow. This fits in closely with the culture of the Melanesian people where there is a strong obligation for people to marry.


It has been a great joy to share the pastoral care of the Third Order in the Australian Province with the Minister Provincial and the Regional Ministers.
